						Knowledge Organiser- over the next two weeks we will focus on the Bronze Age. Look at timeline to work out time difference from the start of the Stone Age to the start of the Bronze Age. Watch: https://www.bbc.co.uk/teach/class-clips-video/story-of-britain-bronze-age-britain/znrygwx Introduce Bronze Age. Allow chn to make notes in jotters (in pairs). Explain that the introduction of bronze was such a significant change that this period of history is named after it! Why do you think bronze was better than stone? Discuss points from video. Make links back to Stone Age (neolithic farmers)- Bronze-better tools/ more land can be farmed/ crops grown/ more people fed Explain that today we are going to find out more about the Bronze Age and why making things out of bronze meant such significant changes for society.
