Wow! What a busy and proactive term it has been. We started the term by electing new PRIDE ambassadors for this year. We held a whole school assembly to remind pupils of what each value was and shared examples of the types of activities each ambassador group would be completing. In classes KS2 pupils presented themselves to be put up for election and each class voted for their representatives for each value. Below is a snapshot of all the hard work the ambassadors have completed so far.

Our term started by electing our Positivity ambassadors: William, Ava-Grace, Florence, Eden, Chloe and Clara. These Positivity ambassadors have met regularly throughout the term to discuss the ways we can promote Positivity in our school. They have led an assembly and introduced our new class positivity books, which each class use to ensure the children can discuss their thoughts regarding how to approach challenges involving friendships, work and behaviour.

The Respect ambassadors met initially in September to discuss the plans for this year. Their first major job was to host anti-bullying week. The Respect team planned and delivered a whole school assembly to discuss this year's theme 'Choose Respect' the children demonstrated great courage as they led the entire assembly and ensured all pupils understood what the message was and most importantly understanding what bullying is, how we can prevent it and what to do if you feel you are being bullied.





This half term, our Integrity ambassadors got together to kick start their responsibilities by organising a whole school assembly to coincide with 'Road safety week'. They also invited the team from VIA into school to give a workshop to our youngest children in school.

They reminded everyone about the importance to stop, look and listen and the four important rules to staying safe whilst crossing the road.

- 1. Always hold hands and listen to grown-ups
- 2. To walk and not run when crossing the roads
- 3. Always find a safe place to cross one where we can see the traffic clearly
- 4. That there are lots of safe places to play that is not the pavement.

Over the course of the past half term, our Determination ambassadors have got together on several occasions, to discuss how they can impact on all children's determination both inside and outside of the classroom. We agreed that providing a visual reminder, in the form of posters, of the need to be determined, in each classroom, would help. Their messages are concise, and their chosen images clearly demonstrate the importance of being determined as a learner. Additionally, our 'Determination team' have continued to motivate children in KS2 by sharing each week's TTR battle results and handing out certificates to children who have shown the greatest levels of determination to make progress.
